Addendum to the Online 2009-2010 Undergraduate Catalogue

Listed below are changes that were approved after the posting of the 2009-2010 undergraduate catalogue. With the exception of the change in the tuition surcharge, these changes are effective with the 2009-2010 academic year.

Catalogue Updates:

p. 63 -- Scholarships and Financial Aid

The Isidro Carbajal Diversity Scholarship in Education was created [donor's name omitted per their request] in honor of Isidro Carbajal, a dedicated teacher who supports the Hispanic/Latino community. It is a merit scholarship of \$1,000 and is available to a first generation students and North Carolina residents pursing an education a degree and who is actively involved to teach or help others in the Hispanic and Latino community. The scholarship is awarded annually by Centro Hispano.

THR 433. Applied Performance IV (3) Prerequisites: THR 231, 232, 301, 302, 332, and 333 and consent of instructor. Explores acting styles in various historical periods of the theatre, such as Greek, Commedia dell'Arte, Shakespearean and Neo-classical.

p. 91 -- Chancellor's Achievement Award

Undergraduate students who complete a minimum of 15 hours in a semester with no grade lower than "A-" qualify for this award. Pass/fail hours will not be used in the calculation of the Chancellor's Achievement Awards.

p. 33 -- Admissions - Senior Citizens

North Carolina General Assembly Session Law 2009-451, Senate Bill 202, Section 8.11.(b) repealed the waiving of tuition for North Carolina citizens age 65 and older.

p. 38, 82 -- Expenses - Tuition Surcharge -- (increased from 25% to 50%)

Effective fall 2010, all new undergraduates seeking a baccalaureate degree at the University of North Carolina Wilmington will be subject to a 50% tuition surcharge if they take more than 140 credit hours to complete a four-year degree program or more than 110% of the required credit hours to complete an officially designated five-year program.

Note: The State Scholarship Program for Children of War Veterans administered by the North

Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs <u>will not cover</u> the 50% tuition surcharge. Responsibility for the surcharge would be placed on the student.
